Dear Friends and Benefactors,

The Catholic Church, - Mother, Bride and Mystical Body of Christ, - is undergoing Her bitter Passion. One of the titles used by the Catholic Church for the Virgin Mary is Co-Redemptrix. By "Coredemption" we mean Mary's unique sharing in the payment of the price of our Redemption: through, with, in, and under Christ, our only Saviour and Redemer



Ireland, with her official acceptance of abortion and the profane "World

Meeting of Families" held in Dublin last month in support of LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender), has her full share in increasing the sorrows of the Immaculate Heart of Mary this year.

At La Salette, Our Lady wept bitterly over the sins of mankind. How much more bitter and abundant must be the tears she is shedding today. Indeed, in Hobbs, New Mexico, a solid bronze life size statue of Our Lady of Guadalupe was recently found to be weeping

tears of olive oil with the scent of chrism. It is as

though she were telling us how those anointed and consecrated to God,

(namely every baptized Catholic, but especially the clergy), are grieving her Immaculate Heart.

Mary is the Mother of the Church, but in a mysterious way she is also a figure of the Catholic Church Herself. So we may well picture the Church weeping bitterly, her heart likewise pierced by seven swords. These seven swords traditionally represent the seven sorrows Our Lady suffered during the physical passion of her Divine Son when He was on earth. Today they can be seen to represent the seven Sacraments of the Catholic Church which have all been profaned and attacked by modernists.

Can we witness the sufferings of Holy Mother Church today unmoved? Can we picture to ourselves the tears of Mary without mingling our own tears with hers?

In proportion to the measure in which the Mass has come to be regarded as a meal rather than a Sacrifice, the Passion of the Church has progressed. As members of the Mystical Body of a Crucified Lord, we must have a personal share in the sufferings of the Passion. We ourselves must become living sacrifices, the living sacrificial Mass which has, as it were, been forced down into the Catacombs once more. For unto this are you called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving you an example that you should follow His steps.' 1 Pet 221



Many of the early Christians were privileged to share in the Passion by their bloody martyrdom. The opportunity to lay down one's life for Christ by the shedding of blood is given to very few people today. But the opportunity for a **white martyrdom** presents itself to every Catholic who is willing to make the Faith the centre of their life.

We find ourselves in a world which is opposed to all that is hard and entails suffering; a world which loves comfort and ease, promoting the worship of self rather than of God. Therefore merely to keep the Faith today, in all its fullness, is to stand with Mary at the foot of the Cross and share in the Passion as she did that first Good Friday — a martyrdom of soul rather than of body. It means to step out of the mainstream and being scorned by the crowd. It means arming ourselves with the courage of Saint Veronica, who, in stepping out from the crowd, dared to show her love for the Truth more than for her own life. Love for the Truth means being persecuted by those who are

The executioner represents all those who, under the guise of a false obedience, carry out the orders of a wicked ruler. To be more precise, the many zombie-like Novus ordo Catholics who forget (or choose to ignore), that there is a Higher Authority to Whom they owe obedience first.

Isn't this similar to what the devil must have said to the Freemasons: "Seek for nothing but the head of the Catholic Church-the Pope."?

The devil, the Freemasons, the world, the lukewarm Catholics... All have had their share in seeking the death of the Church and appear to have well nigh attained their goal.
